Worship

Worship is central to school life and valued by all. Visitors often lead worship. This is a time of worship for everyone – not just the children.

Learning Walk

Children are very knowledgeable about their school and were so proud to show me and the governors round. They particularly focused on aspects of Christian distinctiveness, such as prayer areas and RE displays.

Religious Education

All of the lessons were of a very high standard and demonstrated the children's spiritual development through clear, challenging questioning and supported time to reflect. Year ¾ were considering 'getting to a higher ground' – one child responded with; 'to get on higher ground, you put others before yourself.' 'If someone takes your coat, someone needs it more that you. '
